ORIENTATION WEEK

All transfer students, all students in Miss Wood's Kindergarten and Primary Training School, nursing education, second-semester entrants, and students who entered Macalester in the 1952 summer session are included in Orientation Week social events.

REGISTRATION

All new students will be notified of their registration time by special announcements and posted lists during Orientation Week.

Be sure to bring your fountain pen and a sharpened pencil when you come to register.

BOOKS

Books and complete supplies are purchased at the Bookstore on ground floor of the Student Union after registration is completed.

PAYMENT OF FEES

Several plans are available to you in arranging for the payment of your tuition, board and room, i.e., 1) Some students carry a blank check made out to Macalester College, with the amount to be filled in later. 2) Others when they register ask the college to send an itemized bill home to their parents. Or they secure the bill to send home or take care of themselves—for payment in cash or check within the first ten days. 3) Still others wish to pay in monthly installments as explained in our 1952 catalog at the top of page 155. We are glad to accept your personal checks, or travellers checks, and for those who are Military Veterans enrolling under the G.I. Bill, we need only to receive your approved "Certificate of Eligibility and Entitlement," Form 1950. In general, the college is agreeable to any method of payment that you and your parents wish.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS

It is the responsibility of each new student to have a physical examination done by his family physician before registration. This examination should be recorded on a Macalester College Health Service form and returned to the college.

MAC GRILLE HOURS

The Mac Grille will be open from 8:40 a.m. to 4:15 p.m. daily beginning Monday, September 8. Saturday hours are from 8:40 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

CHOIR TRY-OUTS

All students interested in try-outs for the College Choir (Music 105) should make an appointment at the Music Department desk at the time of registration.

BAND REHEARSAL

If you are interested in playing in the Macalester College Band, you may indicate your interest and receive instructions for the first rehearsal from Dr. Grant at the Education Department desk during registration.
