Council Urges Letter Writing Effort On Pedestrian Problem

October 28

At Wednesday's meeting, the Community council spent much effort discussing the problem of pedestrian crossing on Grand avenue and on Summit avenue.

Under reports, member Paul Anderson reported on a meeting he had with members of the St. Paul department of public safety. He stated that he feels the department is facing a real dilemma about how to handle the problem, partly because they are opposed to flashing light crosswalks. Paul stated that he feels the only way action will be forthcoming is if students pressure the department for a solution.

Under new business, a motion was passed creating a committee for Safe Crossings to recommend solutions to the pedestrian problems. The rules were then suspended and the CC passed a motion urging individuals and campus groups to "exert pressure" on the department of public safety and the traffic engineers through a campaign of telephoning and letter writing.

In other business, reports were heard from Dean Kramer on administration matters, athletic coordinator Wes Stansbury, academic coordinator Corine Olson, NSA coordinator Sue DeVries, the bookstore committee, services committee, leadership training conference, organizations and rule committee and union board.

It was reported in answer to a previous request that KMCL can, if given proper notice, broadcast any Community Council meeting which might be of interest to the campus at large.

The Council also passed three other motions. They were: to establish a permanent convocation review committee to evaluate the sys-

tem, especially such problems as accumulated cuts and graduated cuts; to recommend to the faculty, administration, athletic and homecoming committees that scheduling allow for a least one week between midsemesters and homecoming; that the CC recommend to the administration and business office that the policy on room rental refund for students who withdraw from school be the same as on food and tuition; that is, a certain percentage of the room rental be refunded.

Under appointments, the following people were appointed to the convo committee: Phil Greer, Frank Fly, Bob Whalen, Judy Brown, Marilyn Schuman, Mary James and Chuck Rund. The following people were appointed to the chapel-confrontation committee: Jim Boler, Betsy Collins, Jim Thompson, Jerry Challman and Sharon Gerden.

From the social area, the following appointments were made: Carol Harris and Steve Fields, Christmas formal; Linda Akerson and Bob Springborg, Sno Week.

October 21

The clothes controversy was the main topic of contention at the Oct. 21 meeting.

At the Sept. 30 meeting, Bob Stanich had presented the following motion, which passed:

Whereas school spirit, pride, and unity is accomplished through academic and athletic excellence and awareness and whereas there have been instances of threats to those wearing certain apparel: be it resolved that the use of such threats and pressures be wholeheartedly rejected by the Macalester college community government.

At the following meeting, a substitute amendment was presented by Brian Coyer after it was agreed to reconsider the motion. The amendment rejected any attempts by the faculty, administration, or single student organization to regulate the "style of life" of a student unless necessary under codified law of the community. This substitute, which was tabled for a week, was defeated at Wednesday's meeting and the original motion passed in its original form.

In other business, the CC heard the treasurer's report, administration report, which assured that the administration was working to get more out lines on the campus phone system, and the organization and rules committee report.

The NSA coordinator reported that the administration OKed the idea of a "Fast for Freedom" if the food service would agree to refund money to the students. It was reported on Oct. 28 that the food service would not agree to such a plan, so the coordinator is now investigating a plan whereby students would simply donate the price of a meal to the cause.

Social coordinator Dave Bloom reported extensively on the progress of the interdorm council, including the fact that the council had asked each dorm to allocate \$5 to enable the ID council to be autonomous from the CC.

The mock election committee reported the election will be held Nov. 2 in U21.

Under appointments, Judy Caine and Wes Stansbury were appointed co-chairmen of next year's Leadership Training Conference. Jerry Challman was appointed Peace corps representative.

The council passed a motion setting up a chapel and confrontation review committee.
