Political Awareness Month Set for October

In addition to Black and Women's History months next year, Mac students will be treated to a new twist in educational activities. Four student groups announced last week that they will be sponsoring "Political Awareness Month: Aiming for Ideological Diversity," this coming October.

The Mac Conservatives are organizing "The Politization of Academia Week" and "Western Civilization Week," which will lead off the month. All Humans Have

Equal Rights (AHER), the pro-life group, will be sponsoring "Law & Public Policy Week," and the Mac Capitalists will be running "Capitalist Ideology Week." The Group For National Parks Privatized (GNP-squared), a right-wing environmentalist group, will be sponsoring "Alternative Solutions Week" to end up the month.

"No debate is conclusive unless both sides have been adequately represented," said Gustavo Rodriguez, the new president of AHER, "and there have been very few

conclusive debates on this campus."

The groups will be bringing various speakers to campus, including Dinesh D'Souza, an Indian scholar who has been cited in recent periodicals about the trends of political correctness on U.S. campuses.

Other activities will include debates, workshops, video presentations, and a student journal publication, according to Chad Odwazny, president of GNP-squared.

"We saw a lot of leftist groups on campus covering the same ground over and

over, wasting student money," explained Garry Smith, head of the Mac Capitalists. "By consolidating our efforts, we're maximizing the output of each student dollar. Of course that's to be expected of capitalists, but we'll get to that later," Smith added.

Dave Frenz, head of the Mac Conservatives, will also be organizing the four groups to stage a formal wine-and-cheese dance in December.
