MACALESTER COLLEGE

More than a century ago, a small graduating class assembled to receive the first degrees ever awarded by Macalester College.

A few years earlier, Macalester's founders were planning courses, hiring faculty, completing a classroom-office-residence building, and recruiting students in preparation for the College's opening in September 1885.

The legacy of those founders—Presbyterian ministers and educators whose standards of excellence allowed no compromise—is a liberal arts college recognized for its academic excellence, its commitment to international and intercultural understanding, and its tradition of community involvement.

To carry out its educational mission, Macalester has assembled a distinguished faculty of 148 full-time and 63 part-time teachers and scholars who represent 27 academic departments. Macalester's 1,753 full-time and 61 part-time students are drawn from virtually every state in the U.S. and 72 other nations. Their academic achievements are numerous and impressive, as demonstrated by awards including nine Rhodes Scholarships, and, in the last 12 years, 36 Fulbright-Hays Awards, 17 National Science Foundation Fellowships, six Foreign Government Grants from the Institute of International Education, five Truman Scholarships, four Thomas J. Watson Fellowships, three Andrew W. Mellon Fellowships in the humanities, three Howard Hughes Medical Institute Predoctoral Fellowships, two Goldwater Fellowships, a Beinecke Brothers Memorial Scholarship, and a British Marshall Scholarship. Macalester's international emphasis is reflected in the fact that nearly half of its students study abroad during their college careers. The College's involvement in the concerns of the community finds more than 700 students each year serving as volunteers or interns in area business firms, service agencies, government offices and cultural organizations in the Twin Cities and elsewhere.

Nearly 60 percent of Macalester graduates go to graduate school within five years. Macalester alumni have pursued careers in business, medicine, law, social service, government, the arts, religion and many other fields. They have made significant contributions to their professions, their communities and their families. The alumni of the past century welcome into their ranks the Macalester College graduates of 2001—Macalester's 112th graduating class—and wish them success and fulfillment.

You have achieved one of the highest accolades of the legal profession and of your country. In 1994 you were appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate to a lifetime appointment to the United States District Court for the District of Minnesota, the twenty-eighth such judge in Minnesota and the first African-American. Before ascending to the federal bench, you served the State of Minnesota for almost eleven years as a trial judge.

The aspirational words over the entrance of the U.S. Supreme Court are "Equal Justice Under Law." Our reality often falls short, but you have devoted yourself to making that aspiration a reality. After graduation from the University of Minnesota Law School in 1972 and a start in litigation with the U.S. Department of Health Education and Welfare, your entire career before ascending to the bench was spent defending people who could not afford to hire a lawyer—first with the Neighborhood Justice Center in St. Paul and then with the Legal Rights Center and the Hennepin County Public Defender's Office in Minneapolis.

As a federal and state judge, you have achieved a reputation for fairness and professionalism toward those who appear before you, but you also

have spent many hours promoting fairness in the court system. You co-chaired the Criminal Process Committee and chaired the Editorial Committee of the Minnesota Supreme Court Racial Bias Task Force. You chair the Pretrial Release and Bail Evaluation Committee for the U.S. District Court. As a criminal case assignment judge in Hennepin County, you tackled delays in the criminal docket with a caseload reduction program for which WCCO Radio awarded you the Good Neighbor Award. You served on the Minnesota Attorney General's Task Force on the Prevention of Sexual Violence Against Women. You wrote the Minority Report for the Minnesota Supreme Court's Task Force on Closed Circuit Television, which was adopted by the Court. You take the time to work with young lawyers and law students on trial skills and ethics in the Douglas Amdahl Inn of Court. You served as an attorney commissioner on the Minneapolis Civil Rights Commission and on the Board of the Minnesota Lawyers International Human Rights Committee.

You are a national expert on the use of DNA evidence in the trial process. You have been appointed to a six-year term on the United States Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court.

Macalester is proud to claim you as a 1969 graduate in political science and economics—a recipient of the Ralph L. Smith Freedom Scholarship, a teaching assistant in the political science department, chair of the Black Liberation Affairs Committee, and a varsity basketball player. In 1989, we recognized you with the Distinguished Citizen Award. Today, we recognize your achievements in the legal profession and your life-long commitment to making Equal Justice under Law more than words chiseled on a building. Macalester College is honored to bestow upon you the Degree of Doctor of Laws, *honoris causa*.

Your Macalester College majors in history and French enhanced your international perspective and your evolving commitment to human rights. You continued your education by studying in Greece, completing a Master's in American Civilization at the University of Pennsylvania, earning a law degree from the American University, and a Master's in International Law from Harvard University. In 1991, you joined the faculty of the Pennsylvania State University's Dickinson School of Law. You have published many law review articles and monographs and made formal presentations world-wide on human rights issues ranging from refugees to abuses against women to hate speech to racial discrimination to improvement of protective measures and regulatory procedures. You have given testimony and filed briefs in numerous international and national venues including before the United Nations, the Court of Human Rights, and the United States Congress.

Throughout your adult life, you have been engaged in rights-related movements including civil liberties lobbying in Washington for such organizations at the Mexican-American Legal Defense Fund and Human Rights Watch. You currently serve on the boards of several international human rights organizations including the Center for Justice and Accountability and Survivors International.

You became active in Amnesty International in 1977, first as a participating member and later as a volunteer lawyer. In addition to vital casework, you co-founded the Amnesty International—USA Legal Support Network that organizes and coordinates legal work by U.S. attorneys. You served as delegate and legal expert on Amnesty International's important

missions to Pakistan, Malawi, Yemen, and India. You have served in key positions including Chair of the U.S. delegation to Amnesty International's International Council. You served in London as Legal Advisor and Director of Amnesty International's Legal Office, where you directed the work of Amnesty's staff and volunteers in London, in AI's United Nations offices in Geneva and New York, and in affiliates throughout the world. In this role, you have forcefully articulated the causes of human rights abuses, the deep responsibilities of nation-states and international organizations, and the grave costs of silence and preferred ignorance.

You are now returning to be a professor of international law, continue to write on crucial human rights conflicts, and be a legal consultant to Amnesty International. Your main project recently has been writing a manual that AI is publishing on how activists can use international human rights mechanisms to combat racial discrimination. As always, you continue to integrate human rights activism into your teaching, scholarship, and life.

A human-rights activist who has worked with you for over twenty years has said of you, "She has this incredible passion for justice. She sees the role that she can play and the importance of her contribution. She is tireless... a marvelous example of someone who refuses to give in or be overpowered by the forces of evil."

Douglas A. Johnson, Class of 1971, Doctor of Humane Letters
Citation by Andrew A. Latham, Assistant Professor of Political Science,
Macalester College

Doug Johnson, Macalester is proud of you. In 1971, you graduated from the College having earned a Bachelor of Arts, *cum laude*, and embarked upon a life of service, humanitarian activism and internationalism that has made a positive and meaningful difference in the lives of countless people living in the Twin Cities and around the world. Following your time at Macalester, you continued your education, studying for a Master's degree in Political Philosophy and Ethics at the University of Minnesota. In 1979, you co-founded the Infant Formula Action Coalition (INFACT), initiating and leading a boycott against Nestlé for its abusive marketing of infant formula in the developing world. In so doing, you organized the first successful transnational grass-roots consumer boycott and brought about what remains today the only international marketing code to be created by the United Nations. You have also served as a consultant on organizational change and strategic planning to various human rights organizations in Latin America. From 1985 to 1993, you were an Associate Fellow at the Institute for Policy Studies in Washington, D.C.; and in 1988, you were an Associate Fellow at the Albert Einstein Program on Strategic Uses of Non-Violent Sanctions in Boston, Massachusetts. In 1988, you also received a Master's degree in Public and Private Management from the Yale School of Organization and Management.

Without in any way diminishing the importance of these scholarly and humanitarian achievements, perhaps your greatest contribution to the cause of humanitarianism has been your constancy of purpose in strengthening and expanding the Center for Victims of Torture (CVT)—an organization founded in 1985 as the first treatment center for the counseling and rehabilitation of survivors of politically motivated torture and their families in the United States. Since 1988, you have been the

Executive Director of the CVT and, under your stewardship, the Center has become internationally respected for its direct-care programs in the Twin Cities and Africa, for its research and professional training, and for its public advocacy on behalf of those who have endured and survived torture.

Your leadership at the CVT has led you into related fields of international service and activism. You are currently a member of the Advisory Panel on the Prevention of Torture recently formed by the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe to develop a strategy for ending torture in that region. In 1998, you served as a member of a panel of experts with the OSCE's Office for Democratic Institutions and Human Rights. In 1997, you were a public member of the United States delegation to a meeting of the OSCE dealing with humanitarian and human rights issues. And in 1996, you were a McKnight Fellow at the Salzburg Seminar on International NGO Collaboration.

Your commitment to service, humanitarian activism and internationalism has earned you honors and accolades, including the Archbishop John Ireland Award for Distinguished Service to Social Justice, the Letelier-Moffit Human Rights Award (which you accepted on behalf of INFAC), the Twin Cities International Citizen Award, and most recently a National Crime Victims Service Award—the Justice Department's highest civilian award.

Doug Johnson, Macalester is proud of you, for you are the very embodiment of the College's core values of internationalism and service to the community. You are also a sterling example to the graduating students assembled before us today of what it means to be true to—and to live by—those values. For your activism and achievements, for a lifetime of embodying the Macalester ethos, and for your constancy of purpose in helping create a humane and healing place for those who have suffered and survived torture, Macalester College is honored to bestow upon you the Degree of Doctor of Humane Letters, *honoris causa*.

THE COMMENCEMENT SETTING

Guests at Macalester's 112th Commencement exercises are seated on the front lawn of the campus. The land itself was part of a farm before it was purchased by the College's Trustees in 1874, the year in which Macalester was chartered by the Minnesota Legislature. Having secured the property, the Trustees sold the building which had housed Macalester's predecessor institution, the Baldwin School. That building was a former tourist hotel, the Winslow House at St. Anthony Falls in Minneapolis, donated to the Trustees by Philadelphia banker Charles Macalester on the promise that the new college would be named for him.

On the Saint Paul land, the Trustees built Old Main; the east wing (removed for construction of the library) was completed first at a cost of about \$25,000. The College opened officially on September 16, 1885. Macalester's founder, The Rev. Edward Duffield Neill, gave the main dedication address to five professors, six freshmen and 52 preparatory students from the Baldwin School. The west wing of Old Main (the portion still standing) was constructed for about \$100,000 in 1887; its exterior was refurbished in 1985 and its interior in 1993.

The College's DeWitt Wallace Library, opened in fall 1988, is linked with and pays architectural homage to Old Main. It provides 600 seats in individual and group settings, houses 454,000 volumes, catalogued by computer, and will accommodate future technological change. Alumni and friends contributed \$10 million to build the library and \$5 million to endow maintenance and the book collection.

To the west of Old Main is Carnegie Hall, built in 1910 through a gift from philanthropist Andrew Carnegie. Once home to Macalester's science departments, Carnegie now houses the social science departments.

South of Old Main is the Janet Wallace Fine Arts Center, a gift of DeWitt '11 and Lila Acheson Wallace, founders of the *Reader's Digest*. The center was named for Mr. Wallace's mother, who was the wife of Dr. James Wallace, Macalester's fifth president. It was Dr. Wallace who, as acting president from 1894 to 1900 and as president from 1900 to 1906, strove and sacrificed to save the College from the brink of bankruptcy and worked diligently to establish the College's widespread reputation for educational excellence.

The Olin-Rice Science Center, which was renovated in 1997, provides space for science classes as well as state-of-the-art laboratories for research and research training. The building is also home to many student-faculty research collaboration projects and cooperative research across disciplines.

The College's athletic facilities, beginning with the award-winning Leonard Natatorium and including a \$1.7 million track and the playing

fields, are east of the Janet Wallace Fine Arts Center, extending to St. Clair Avenue. Expanded practice fields, six tennis courts and a new baseball diamond were added in 1994.

Directly east of Old Main is Kirk Hall, which houses about 150 students. It is named for Robert A. Kirk, who was a longtime Macalester trustee.

North of Kirk is the Ruth Stricker Dayton Campus Center. Completed ahead of schedule in 2001, the center serves as a campus focal point. This center is named in honor of Ruth Stricker Dayton '57, who with her husband Bruce B. Dayton contributed very generously to its construction. Ruth Stricker Dayton is a current trustee and recipient of the Alumni Association's 1987 Distinguished Citizen Citation for her work in health and wellness. Outside the main entrance is the Bateman Plaza, an outdoor gathering place named for Warren Bateman '44, who has been a trustee of the college since 1996.

The Weyerhaeuser Memorial Chapel is an ecumenical place of worship. The hexagonal glass-walled structure was dedicated in 1969. It was a gift of the family of Frederick Weyerhaeuser, a trustee of the College from 1957 until his death in 1961.

Immediately in front of the chapel is the Memorial Garden, a circular garden with the flagpole at its center. It provides a special location for plaques in memory of individuals close to the college.

West of the chapel is Weyerhaeuser Hall (the former library) named in memory of Rudolph M. Weyerhaeuser, a longtime member of the Board of Trustees at Macalester. Built in 1942 and expanded in 1960, the facility in 1989 was converted to administrative offices, a move that has freed other space for classrooms and faculty offices.

Farther to the north and across Grand Avenue are several buildings named after prominent members of the Macalester community. Included among them are the Winton Health Service, given to the College in 1952 by three members of the Winton family in Minneapolis as a memorial to their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles J. Winton; Bigelow Hall, named in memory of Charles H. Bigelow, chair of the Board of Trustees 1925-26 and Frederick R. Bigelow, his brother who served as chair 1937-46; Wallace Hall, named in honor of James Wallace; Doty Hall, named for Margaret MacGregor Doty, a Macalester graduate of 1914 and dean of women 1924-60; Dupre Hall, named for J. Huntley Dupre, professor of history 1946-64 and dean of the College 1951-61; Kagin Dining Commons, named in honor of Edwin Kagin, religion professor 1926-52; Turck Hall, a residence hall named for Charles J. Turck, President of the College 1939-58; and George Draper Dayton Hall, dedicated in 1998, named for the department store founder who became a Macalester trustee in 1894; members of the Dayton family have served on the board continuously since then.

ACADEMIC DRESS AND CUSTOMS

Academic dress stems from the Middle Ages, when scholars were also clerics and wore the costume of the monastic order. The hood was originally a cowl attached to the gown; it could be slipped over the head for warmth. The cap, originally round, later became a square mortarboard.

On appropriate occasions, anyone with a college or university degree may wear academic dress. By observing the style of each costume, one often may identify the university, the degree held and the field of major interest.

The long, pointed sleeve of the gown indicates a bachelor's degree, the closed sleeve with a slit near the upper part of the arm indicates a master's degree. Bachelors' and masters' gowns are black and have no trim.

The doctor's gown is usually black, but some universities prescribe other colors. All doctors' gowns have velvet trim on the front facings and cross-bars on the sleeves. This trim may be black, or may match the edging of the hood.

The color of the velvet edging on the hood indicates the field in which the degree was granted. It should be noted that the doctoral degree often earned is the Ph.D., or doctor of philosophy, in a given subject. The academic costume then displays the color of philosophy, dark blue, rather than the color of the specific subject.

The seal of Macalester College, which appears on the cover of this booklet, was devised by Macalester's founder, The Rev. Edward Duffield Neill. In a sermon preached before the Presbyterian Synod of Minnesota in September 1873, he explained its significance:

"On the corporate seal of the institution are engraved two female figures, one in classic drapery, telescope in hand and compass at the feet, representing Science investigating the laws of Nature; the other in sitting posture and modern dress holding open the word of God, representing Revelation. They are in friendly converse, the twin sisters of Heaven, as the motto suggests, 'Natura et Revelatio, coeli gemini.'"

After the College became a synodical institution the Trustees adopted the seal October 19, 1881.
